MGC STRATEGIC DIRECTION BACKGROUND

A little over two years ago, a strategic planning session was held with members of the MGC Executive Committee and additional Board. At the time it was decided that:

- We need continuity and focus We can't make the organizational changes that are needed if we are changing themes and direction every year.
- We need to focus on fewer things at a time; get them done and in order; and then move on.
- We need to incorporate 21st Century technology into how we function in MGC in order to help bring our organization into compliance with government and regulatory requirements and to use technology to improve our ability to communicate with member clubs.
- We need to provide member (club) benefits that are consistent with needs of the 21st Century.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017-2019

- Carol Broadbeck and I agreed up front, our theme and project would remain the same: Plant America: "Grow and Share" Project: Michigan Pollinator Gardens
- As an organization, we have brought our financial accounting and reporting practices and budgeting process up to 21st century standards. This was a critical activity had to be done in order to maintain our 501c3 status as organization. With our on-going use of an Accounting firm, we now have a process in place to help assure that we will continue to comply, as rules and regulations change in the future.
- We updated our By-Laws.
- We have updated lost of our Policies and Procedures (some are still in the review before adoption stage).
- We have a team ready to work on the MGC Club Handbook as soon as Policies and Procedures are complete.
- We finalized the District Director Handbook.
- We created a Grant program for our member clubs.
- We have been able to provide Group Liability Insurance for ALL member clubs.

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2019 - 2021 OBJECTIVES

The overall objectives of this administration are the following:

- Continue to improve the work processes and practices that are critical for compliance with legal and regulatory requirements.
- Continue to build value of the organization through improved and expanded member services and benefits.
- By utilizing available 21st Century technologies, build a more effective MGC Organization through increased communications and interaction between MGC Board Committee Members and Member Clubs, while making those positions less dependent on travel.
- Provide the tools and training for Board Committee Chairs to do their jobs more effectively and efficiently.
- Build "Brand" awareness of MGC through use of common, standardized templates for various types of communications.
- Provide a means to build in "succession planning" for the Board.

GOAL 1

Increase the effectiveness of the MGC Board of Directors and Chairpersons by streamlining and standardizing tasks associated with each committee Chair.

PLAN 1A: The first step in accomplishing this goal will be to add, wherever appropriate, a common, 'Key Job Responsibilities' section to each chairperson's Job Description.

PLAN 1B: The MGC Executive Board will assist board Committee Chair members in updating and creating effective and detailed job descriptions.

PLAN 1C: Opportunities will be offered at all MGC and District Events for club members to sign up to be part of the 'committee' under each Program Chair. These committee members will serve as the focal point within the club or district for 'The Program', and will be the first communication point for any new information from the MGC Committee Program Chair.

PLAN 1D: While reviewing job descriptions with Committee Chairs, the Executive Board Member and Committee Chair will determine if the job warrants a Committee, and if not, will prepare a recommendation for the Executive Committee to consider making the position an Administrative position, that may or may not require attendance at Board Meetings

2019 - 2021 OBJECTIVES GOAL 2

Develop a 'tool box' as a 'how to', first for the Chairperson, and then for the member clubs. Use of this tool box will help build a relationship between the board member and club presidents and/or designated club member s in support of the specific MGC program.

PLAN 2A The MGC Executive Board will help develop standardized templates for Committee Chairs to use in developing their specific outreach materials. These will be part of the 'Tool Box' for the Committee Chairs to use. They may include, but not necessarily be limited to such things as:

- Standardized presentation templates, letter templates, and checklists, etc.
- Wider use of Constant Contact for communication to club members, and may also include:
 - Overview of Program(s)
 - Identification of member club resources needed.
 - How-to-Step-by-Step instructions for new or existing program(s)
 - Roll out recommendations for District Directors, District Meetings, Information Tables at Convention, Information to, District Presidents Meetings.

PLAN 2B Each MGC program chair will work with their executive board member in development of their Program outreach materials. This should be a collaborative effort between the executive board member and their respective committee chairs and a continuation of work that was started at the last board meeting.

PLAN 2C The board will immediately begin evaluation and implementation of teleconferencing and video-conferencing options for use by the Board as a whole and/or for smaller groups, such as committee meetings as well as for outreach to member clubs.

PLAN 2D We will begin having short, ½ hour teleconferences on a routine basis with members throughout the organization: "Monday Morning Member Meetings" hosted by the MGC President, covering a variety of topics. Mondays will also be the designated day to contact the President with questions, issues, or concerns.



2019 - 2021 OBJECTIVES

GOAL 3

Continue to increase the number of pollinator gardens maintained by member clubs and club members throughout in the state.

PLAN 3A Continue emphasis of pollinator gardening in MGC Grant program.

PLAN 3B Emphasize improving pollinator habitat in appropriate curriculum sections of NGC Schools.

PLAN 3C Emphasize pollinator gardens in MGC Presidents Reports – # pollinator gardens registered with Million Pollinator Garden Challenge; club programs, speakers.

PLAN 3D A Presidents Mission Fund Award for this administration will be tied to number of registered pollinator gardens.

GOAL 4

Strengthen our Youth Activities Programs to extend 'succession planning' not just for Board members but to create 'succession planning' for garden club members. By encouraging youth activities, we not only build awareness of MGC clubs within the local communities, but sow the seeds of building awareness and ultimately interest in becoming a garden club member, not just for the students, but also for their parents.

PLAN 4A Encourage more clubs to promote the NGC High School Essay Contest at their local High School. Note: Some clubs already offer their own 'scholarship award' to their Essay Contest winner.

PLAN 4B Provide an MGC Award to the State-wide High School Essay contest winner.

Implementation of these Goals and Plans will be the primary emphasis of committee work and reporting during Board meetings.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As I prepared to begin my administration a year ago, I developed the Strategic Direction for the 2019-2021 administration, along with key objectives, goals and initial plans. It was based on an assessment of where we had come from two years prior and the progress that had been made during the previous administration. I shared that Strategic Direction with all the Board Members at our first meeting the day after the conference. The Board quickly adopted the goals and plans, the President's Mission Fund and to begin funding the High Essay Contest. I hope you all had a chance to review the Strategic Direction for 2019-2021 on pages 3-6 of this Annual Report.

Several of our initial overall objectives revolved around developing better ways of utilizing technology to build a more effective MGC Organization, still managed by volunteers. That need became abundantly clear during the strategic planning session held with the Executive Committee in August, 2019. Our need to incorporate technology hit virtually every aspect of what we do as an organization from how we keep and share important documents to how we work within the board, to how we communicate with club members and board members.

Many of the things we have worked on have been administrative changes and improvements that might not be very visible to you as members, but are absolutely imperative for MGC in order to be a strong, vibrant organization as we look toward our future.

- For example, we now have at least two people with "Administrator" privileges for each of our critical services: Website, Facebook, Roster Processing, and Constant Contact. I hope to add back up for our Newsletter soon.
- We continue the step-wise implementation of the recommendations from the last financial audit. We continue to reduce the number of satellite checking accounts associated with the MGC EIN number, and our financial policies and procedures not only provide internal accountability and control, but are consistent with 21st Century best practices. Utilizing an accounting firm on a routine basis helps us assure, that we become aware of, and implement, new regulatory requirements in a timely fashion.



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PRESIDENT'S REPORT, Cont.

- We began using conference calls and Zoom meetings within committees and the Board, in the fall and through the winter. This has allowed us to continue to make good progress with our goals and plans, while positioning us to be able to carry on in the face of COVID.
- We formed an ad hoc Technology Committee and it is now a permanent committee with a Technology Chair.
- We have started using Microsoft Teams to organize how we work as a board.
 - This gives us internal board email addresses, with administrator capabilities to be able to reset passwords, so email accounts will never be lost, frozen, or otherwise become unusable.
 - Provides document storage capability with HIPPA level security. This will give us the capability to be able to pass on USABLE files to the next person who assumes a position on the board, while minimizing the on-going need to store volumes of paper files for record retention. This simple, time saver for someone doing a volunteer job, is the difference between choosing or not choosing, to volunteer.
- We have a team in place to update Job (Position) Descriptions, and ensure they are consistent and adequately reflect the key position responsibilities.

We faced and overcame several unanticipated challenges this past year:

- We regained control of our MGC Facebook Page.
- Our brand new Recording Secretary, Lois Anderson, needed to resign, due to health issues. We miss the opportunity to work with her. However, we are fortunate that Jenny Bond volunteered to fulfill her duties.
- We resolved a copyright license infringement allegation relative to the use of a photo on our website.

This is an amazing and exciting time for Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. (MGC). We are utilizing technology to change the way we do things:

 Although we had to cancel our Annual State Conference and many other District and Education Events, we were able to hold the first EVER NGC Accredited Zoom Tri-Refresher. We had 85 participants from 22 different states! Congratulations to Rita Crawley, Lynn Dinvald and Laura Grainger for organizing a highly successful event!



PRESIDENT'S REPORT, Cont.

We are utilizing technology to change other things we do:

- We are streamlining our Roster and Dues Collection process. This will not only make the process of updating our member information substantially less time consuming, but it will assure that our District Directors are the first to know of changes or additions to Club member information, and it will make it easier for all involved to do updates as needed throughout the year. Many thanks to Anne Crimmins for leading this effort.
- We are phasing out of many of our mass printed materials. As an environmentally conscious organization, minimizing excess paper copies of things that end up in the trash anyway, not only saves money for MGC, but also literally helps save a tree. Beginning this year, we are encouraging all members to receive their newsletters via email. Some members still need a print copy of the newsletter so we are giving club presidents the option of receiving up to 5 copies of the newsletter which can be distributed as needed within their club. The money saved, almost \$6000/per year, can better be spent on programs like Youth Awards, Grants and Scholarships, just to name a few examples. Many thanks to the team of Monica Taylor, Bernadine Bennett, Charley Bohland and Michele Amstrong for leading this effort.
- We are pushing forward on youth contest support. In addition to awards for the High School Essay contest at the District and State level, which we began last year, we will also fund both the Smokey Bear Woodsy Owl Poster AND the Youth Sculpture contests, beginning this fiscal year. Not only are these students our potential gardener club members, but so are their parents! Investing in our future is one of the best ways we can spend our money!
- We jumped from 'thinking about' members conference call meetings straight to Monday Morning Member Meetings via Zoom. We are now offering more educational and special interest events as zoom meetings. This will provide club members the ability to join directly or to hold their own zoom meetings and draw upon the group talks already recorded. This will also allow members from across the state, who are interested in specific topics, to connect and share with each other.
- We will be holding more of our Board meetings as zoom meetings and utilize the technology available to us for smaller team and committee meetings. Taking advantage of technology not only helps us fulfill needs created by COVID, but gives us the opportunity to reach more people who would not normally be able to participate in board meetings because of the cost of travel.

We will continue to seek more opportunities to use technology to strengthen our organization and provide value to our members. Lastly, thank you all for the many ways you have faced the challenges brought to us by COVID and managed to continue bringing beauty to your communities.

Report 2nd Quarter (Sept, Oct, Nov 2019) Michigan Garden Clubs February 16, 2020 Investments: MGC investments performed exceptionally well during the quarter. From September 1 through November 30 the new Raymond James investment showed a gain of \$2,567.

The Morgan Stanley accounts returned a total of \$11,933 for the quarter. Although this rate of growth may not be sustained, the markets are benefiting MGC at this time with total investment income for the second quarter of \$14,027.

Corporate Revenue/Expenses: Total MGC revenue for the second quarter was \$64,043, which included almost \$12,000 from School registrations and a little more than \$21,000 from the Districts and the FS Judges Symposium. Revenue for this quarter was from events, investments, donations, and dues (in that order). Expenses for the period totaled \$59,012 which left a surplus for the quarter of \$5,031.

MGC Accounts: At the urging of our CPA, MGC has gradually been simplifying its financial accounts and systems over the past few years. Maintaining multiple accounts increases accounting costs and lessens internal controls. All school checking accounts, the annual conference checking accounts, and now the Flower Show Judges Symposium account have all been closed. With the advent of electronic communications, one MGC Corporate checking account now accommodates all of these activities. A pilot program with District III is now underway to test whether districts feel they need to maintain separate checking accounts. MGC is now using bill.com to pay almost all invoices and reimbursements, and expenses are automatically conveyed electronically and stored in MGC QuickBooks data at Seber Tans.

Budget to Actuals: Comparing the actuals to the budgeted amounts, the MGC revenue at halfway through the year is at about 72% of budget which means our MGC revenue for the whole year will likely be higher than budgeted – GOOD NEWS. The MGC expenses at the end of the second quarter are at 56% of budget which means MGC's expenses are occurring as budgeted and at a lower rate than revenue.

Again, that is good news.

The MGC First Vice-President serves on the Executive Committee and MGC Board of Directors as Chair of the District Activities and Membership Committee. Five of the seven District Directors were new to their position. The finalized District Director Handbook has been a good resource for the District Directors. The District Directors met as a group prior to the Executive Committee to work on their best practices, to share ideas and strengthen communications with each other. This group of committed District Directors were eager to work within their District to communicate, engage and assist their District Clubs and support and promote MGC activities. It has been my pleasure to work with each of you -- Ruth Moline, Charley Bohland, Anne Crimmins, Michele Armstrong, Carol McGregor, Sue Soderberg and Carol Lauffer. Thanks for all your efforts, your time and your talents you have given to support MGC.

An NGC goal is to Plant America with Membership by increasing our membership 21% by 2021! In support of this goal, at each of the seven 2019 Fall District Conferences, we shared membership tips -- how to attract new members, retain current members and bring back members who have drifted away. Articles on this topic were included in the spring issue of the Gate and an article highlighting the success of membership growth of the River Valley Garden Club were showcased. As an organization we continue to offer the MGC Plant America Grow & Share Small Grant Program. The District Directors promote this opportunity within their districts, and to date since its inception in 2017, 21 grants have been awarded for a total of \$3961.96. Projects are many and varied, but all enhance the goals of clubs to support their community by sharing their love of gardening, landscape, floral design and environmental conservation.

In traveling around the state, talking with members, reviewing the presidents' reports and beautiful club yearbooks it is impressive to learn about all of the activities and contributions the MGC Clubs make in their communities and the positive impact they have in the gardening world. Thank You!

Before I prepared this report, I reviewed my Annual Reports for the last 4 years. They were remarkably similar and this report is also much like them.

District I has 30 clubs and about 1200 members. Twenty-seven of the clubs are regular MGC garden clubs and 3 are flower arranger guilds. The district covers Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and St. Clair counties. Unfortunately, we do not have any clubs in Macomb County or in the city of Detroit.

Communication: As District Director, I have communicated with clubs and individuals by email, phone calls, newsletters, reminders, forwarding MGC and NGC informational

announcements and by writing articles about individual clubs for the MGC

publication Thru the Garden Gate. I have read and commented on club newsletters and blasts, yearbooks and Club President's Annual Reports. I have attended club meetings and special events. Interactions with individuals and clubs, the sharing of information and encouraging words are probably the most important things I have done this year.



District VI encompasses 12 counties in the central eastern region of the Michigan lower peninsula. There are currently 16 active clubs with a little over 400 members. The district has experienced the loss of one club, Mid-Michigan Flower Arrangers Guild, due to attrition plus a drop in members overall from previous years. I published nine district newsletters [Plant, Cultivate, Harvest!], that were to be distributed by each club to their members. The newsletter contained a variety of information including member recruitment, board skills and responsibilities, member club activities, workshops, and scheduled meetings.

This district has one district meeting in the fall of each year. The Yard and Garden Club of Flint hosted the 2019 Fall District VI Meeting at Genesys Banquet Center in Grand Blanc. Seventy district and state members attended. The 2020 meeting chair, Anne Southworth (Evergreen Garden Club), has been working diligently planning the fall meeting in Midland.

The Caro Garden Club is planning a celebration of the Club's 90th Anniversary for July 2020. Club activities were maintained and enhanced by several clubs this past year. In the works is a Blue Star Dedication by Evening Bloomers Garden Club out of Mount Pleasant and a Blue Star Parkway Project facilitated by the Valley Garden Club of Bay City. The Mount Pleasant Garden Club started the Mount Pleasant Seed Exchange housed in the Veterans Memorial Library in Mount Pleasant. Four clubs submitted President's Award reports by March 31, 2020.

The Midland Garden Council sponsored Series VII, Course II of NGC Environmental School in October 2019. Unfortunately, Series VII, Course III scheduled for April 2020 had to be canceled due to the pandemic. It will hopefully be rescheduled for the fall of 2020.

Port Sanilac and Caro Garden Clubs facilitated participation of local youth in the NGC High School essay contest this year. My participation this year included attendance at MGC Executive Committee meetings, MGC Board meetings, Environmental School, two garden walks, four club meetings, meeting with chairs for the 2019 and 2020 Fall District Meeting and follow-up correspondence plus working on district meeting call letters and meeting agendas. - Carol Lauffer

It was a memorable year in promoting the Black Swallowtail butterfly initiative. During the State Conference in June of 2019, the Legislation Chair was introduced to many club volunteers with a deep commitment to helping educate the public about the Black Swallowtail and working toward the passage of the butterfly bills. Additionally, much of the MGC butterfly literature was distributed to clubs who used the materials for garden walks and tours, club sponsored events and community festivals for the summer and fall months.

During the fall of 2019, the Legislation Chair with the assistance of other dedicated club volunteers presented updates at all the District Fall Conferences. It was at the seven conferences where the attendees participated in a letter-writing campaign addressed to their elected officials asking for hearings in both chambers. More than 850 letters were sent from conference attendees alone. It was especially heartening to hear the many stories of how clubs across Michigan promoted the Black Swallowtail. MGC wishes to thank the many clubs who attended coffee hours and town halls yielding more legislative letters of support than in the past. Aside from the District IIB tri-fold display, four additional displays were purchased. With the help of several volunteers, the displays were creatively designed. These displays allow clubs in most all the districts to have easy access to one for any upcoming events.

Due to the pandemic in the spring, a couple of big events attracting hundreds of visitors were cancelled or participation limited. The Lansing Home and Garden Show and Wedel's 25th Annual Flower and Garden Expo were big losses in terms of promotional activity. Furthermore, with the cancellation of the MGC State Conference, the distribution of materials will be more challenging and expensive to disseminate to the clubs who again need the materials for summer and fall functions. Because of the coronavirus impact on Michigan's economy, our elected officials in Lansing will be very much focused on the upcoming budget, getting businesses back open, and dealing with year-end legislative passage. For local clubs, the best course of action continues to be best served promoting the Black Swallowtail as a pollinator as well as a candidate for State Butterfly.

In the fall, MGC will make every attempt to meet with the principles behind the other butterfly bills to discuss a possible collaborative plan for the coming next legislative session beginning in January of 2021. A final note and shoutout to the MGC leadership and individual club members (too many to list) for their limitless support and encouragement in promoting the Black Swallowtail as the official State of Michigan butterfly. - David Drain

To stay up to date, monitor the Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc., website (michigangardenclubs.org). In the Member Area you'll find the information under the "Projects" tab: Black Swallowtail. Butterflies are both beautiful and important to our ecosystem. The Black Swallowtail is especially important to Michigan. It is found throughout the entire state and it is a permanent resident of Michigan. It does not leave in the winter as many butterflies do. The Black Swallowtail overwinters in Michigan as a pupa, making it a great butterfly for school groups to study. Each Black Swallowtail lives 2+ weeks, with 2-3 generations per year.

Butterflies contribute to thriving ecosystems and are great pollinators. Not only are they objects of beauty in our world but they are a source of food for birds, reptiles, mammals and other insects. Butterflies are harbingers of the fragility of life on our planet. They are particularly sensitive to changes in our environment from the use of harmful pesticides and the loss natural habitat areas.

The Mission of Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. is to promote environmental responsibility. We celebrate the presence and value of butterflies; particularly, our full-time resident butterfly, the Black Swallowtail.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Accomplishments during the 2019-2020 fiscal year include:

- Development of a working method to bill and process reimbursements for individual insurance certificates when required by member Clubs' "landlord".
- Held a Q&A session with Jeff Belen, our insurance advisor, to improve our understanding of the benefits and limitations of our commercial liability insurance program, and to begin the development of best practices guidelines.
- Completion of the 2020-2021 budgeting process, involving available members of the Executive Committee and District Directors. The resulting Budget was presented to the Board in April and approved. Results of the COVID pandemic may create the need for this to be revisited.
- Arranged a Q&A session with partner Brian Krol from our CPA firm, Seber Tans PLC, to build on the Executive Team's ongoing understanding of the 'how and why' of non-profit financial best practices.
- Continued implementation of financial procedure recommendations to centralize and streamline our accounting methods and controls. These recommendations lead us to continue centralizing conference, school, and district checking accounts in a multi-step fashion. The process has been successful for those already 'brought in'.
- Engaged Raymond James, a second investment services firm, allowing us to compare and contrast their management service, advice, and performance with our original firm,
- Morgan Stanley. [COVID-19 market volatility initially resulted in an 8 10% drop in Net Asset Value. Effective April 30th, our holdings have recovered all but $2 2 \frac{1}{2}\%$ of their value. We may continue to see valuation volatility, but since we have no near future need to draw from these funds, any loss is on only paper.]
- Grow and Share grants continue to gain traction, and in addition to some wonderful garden projects, have resulted in strengthened confidence within the participating Clubs and improved networking within their communities.
- In fiscal 2017-18, eight grants were awarded totaling \$1,412. In fiscal 2018-19, ten grants were awarded totaling \$1,950. Although activity is stalled under the constraints of the COVID pandemic, To date five grants totaling \$1,000 have been awarded in fiscal 2019-20 and are estimated to be completed this fall. Development and approval of MGC Document Retention Policy.

We are grateful to the Kalamazoo Garden Council, Inc. for providing space at their Council House to begin storing documents. We continue to work on methods and structures to begin digital storage as well. - Gail Taggart

TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE



In the 2020, the Technology Chair position and the Technology Committee were formed to look at centralize records for the membership database, committies, projects and the many areas we handle as an organiation. We wanted to find a way to streamline communications by implementing dimain-based e-mails, a website change from our current service provider as we felt we were paying more than we thought we should be, and improve how we manage information through the use of technology.

In the early months of 2020, Covid-19 became Pandemic status, gatherings turned into cancellations. Knowing we had much we wanted to accomplish with Technology, the Technology Committee began meeting weekly by end of 2019, and continue to meet on a weekly basis by teleconference. Enter Zoom.us which gave the organization a lifeline to continue moving forward and hold face-to-face meetings with document sharing capability. As Covid continued, the 89th Annual Convention was cancelled. Thanks to the suggestion by Rita Crawley, 3rd Vice President to pursue using Zoom to hold the Tri-Fresher virtually along with support of Janet Hickman, MGC President. With an adventurous Pioneer spirit, I joined in and we took on the risk to offer NGC Tri-Refresher virtually on Zoom. Many hours and training went into this production and overall a great experience albeight some technical glitches that can and do happen with technology. We had 92 participants from 22 states connected without any major technical problems. Following the NGC Tri-Refresher, MGC assisted on a Zoom Beta Committee with NGC to consider offering courses virtually on Zoom for Gardening, Environmental and Landscape Design Schools.

As Technology Chair in an all volunteer-run organization the big challenge comes with the technology itself by way of equipment (PC, MAC, iPads, Tables, Smartphones, and more), different connectivity statewide and multiple versions of software our volunteer members are running. Being up for the challenge, the Technology Committee hit the ground running when COVID-19 stalled us from travel and meeting in groups by using a free conference call service then moved to Zoom video conferencing software to accomplish goals of the committee and more recently migrating to Microsoft 365 using SharePoint and Teams. Rolling out Microsoft 365 and Office 365 to an initial group of thirty leadership positions in MGC is underway in building a centralized document storage bank in the cloud. This enhancement includes new position-based e-mails that will work in overall MGC branding, recognition, and unify communications versus using a personal e-mail address for MGC business offering personal privacy. As terms expire every two years, this provides a mechanism to transfer data, files, and information by a simple password reset, a "turn key" solution to accessing files and information needed for the MGC role you're fulfilling. Creating Facebook Goups of Interest to further engage our members through multiple communications methods is also a focus to help members, clubs, district, state stay connected and informed. I look forward to connecting you to MGC, through the use of technology in support of the ongoing mission to "Grow and Share" wth Michigan Garden Clubs. - Laura Grainger





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LODA LAKE SANCTUARY



The roots of our commitment to teaching about, and reinforcing the importance of the world of pollinators, are firmly imbedded in our on-going support of Loda Lake Wildflower Sanctuary. Loda Lake has been and continues to be the only wildflower sanctuary that is part of the National Park system. Making an association between "wild flowers" and "native plants" helps to link the ideas of protecting native habitat with protecting our native pollinators.

Loda Lake Wildflower Sanctuary is a 72-acre natural area within the Manistee National Forest in west-central lower Michigan. A partnership between the National Forest Service and Michigan Garden Clubs was established in 1949 and we have cooperatively managed the area since that time. MGC is closely involved in planning for site improvements and helping to fund them. Recent improvements have included a new entrance road, improved signage, protective fencing and a rebuilt boardwalk.

The sanctuary is an ideal location for the preservation and observation of wildflowers and other native plants such as pitcher plants, ferns, mosses and ground pines because it includes many different plant habitats. There is a small lake, a boardwalk over a bog and over 2 miles of trails through oak-pine forests, pine plantations and old fields. A recently developed "cultural trail" passes by the foundations of buildings that were once part of a farm that existed on the site in the early 1800's. The trails also connect to the 4,600-mile North Country Trail that passes through Michigan from the Ohio border to Wisconsin leaving the state at Ironwood in the upper peninsula.

NATIVE PLANTS PATCH



Why Go Native in Michigan?

Native plants are species that occurred in our state and surrounding areas prior to European settlement and without human intervention. A plant species is native to the ecoregion where it evolved along with the soil, climate, fauna and other members of the plant community. Native plants have adapted to a particular geographical area but may not be able to exist in any other location. They need little care once established. These plants also attract a host of pollinators like butterflies, bees, birds and beneficial insects to your garden.

A Native Plants Patch was created for the purpose of encouraging garden club members and youth organizations to learn about the importance of incorporating native plants into the landscape. The patch is 3" and can be ironed on most fabrics. The cost to order is \$3 each plus shipping.

A brochure, Why Go Native in Michigan, can be downloaded in pdf form or you can order free copies. A PowerPoint presentation and simple test is encouraged for members to qualify to earn their patch. Additional information is available.

GROUP TAX EXEMPT PROGRAM

For those of you who have been a member of Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc., since 2016, you must be aware of the program and the call to arms about becoming an official nonprofit, tax exempt, 501(c)(3) organization. But you may have forgotten why this is an important program within Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc., (MGC, Inc) and why it is important to YOUR club.

Here are six reasons why your club should be a charitable, nonprofit, tax exempt organization. But first for those who may not know, the status of a charitable, nonprofit, tax exempt organization, a 501(c)(3) status is granted through the Federal Internal Revenue Services as part of the Internal Revenue Code. It is not a status granted by the state of Michigan, although Michigan does honor the status for purposes of income tax liability in Michigan. Now the reasons you should apply for this status:

- If your club is tax exempt, your club does NOT have to pay federal or state INCOME taxes. Without this designation, your club may be liable for federal and state income taxes on all revenue received by your club. I do not have the space to explain why, or even if your club may be liable, but it is possible.
- As a charitable, nonprofit, tax exempt (501(c)(3) organization, donors to your organization will be able to deduct (up to 50%) of their gift from their income taxes. Depending on the size of the donation given, this could be a huge benefit to the donor, as well as to your club.
- As a tax exempt 501(c)(3) organization, donors can name your club as a beneficiary in their wills; but you must present documents to the personal representative of the estate to prove your club is a tax exempt organization. That documentation is usually in the form of a letter from IRS, but if as a member of the Group Tax Exemption Program (GTEP) with Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc., the letter is from MGC, Inc.
- As a tax exempt 501(c)(3) organization, your club may be eligible for and apply for community grants, federal grants, or foundation grants. Most of these organizations do not give monies to any organization that is not a 501(c)(3) organization.
- As a 501(c)(3) organization, you may qualify for nonprofit status discounts with various nonprofit help groups, such as "Tech Soup" (www.techsoup.org) which provides access to discounts for things such as computers or programs for computers, to name just a couple of discounts.



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GROUP TAX EXEMPT PROGRAM

 In Michigan, as a nonprofit, charitable organization with 501(c)(3) status, you will qualify for the sales tax exemption of up to \$10,000.00 on the sale of any items during fundraising projects. (Yes, your sale of flowers each year is an event that may require payment of sales tax.) Alternatively, as a 501(c)(3) organization, your club does not pay sales tax on items purchased for your club's mission and purposes.

There is one other qualification for joining the MGC, Inc., GTEP. Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc., requires that clubs be incorporated in order to join the group. The "why" for this requirement and the process for both incorporating and joining GTEP can be found in the "Incorporating As a Nonprofit Corporation and MGC Group Tax Exempt Handbook on the MGC, Inc., website, under the member side, in the folder titled 501(c)(3).

Reviewing the "Incorporating As a Nonprofit Corporation and MGC Group Tax Exempt Handbook" will give you answers to some of your questions as well as the steps to incorporate your club and become a member of the MGC Group Tax Exempt Program. 
Four Flower Show Books of Evidence were submitted, qualified and were forwarded on to NGC. Three of these submissions were awarded MGC Flower Show Awards.






Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. 2019-2021 Organization Chart Ad Hoc & Standing Committees

POLLINATOR GARDENS
